Institutions Branch (PTIB), the Montessori Infant and Toddler Education program is affiliated by the American Montessori Society (AMS) and accredited by the Montessori Accreditation Council for Teacher Education

(MACTE).

The program focuses on the Infant and Toddler years, while providing comprehensive learning in Montessori philosophies and practice, Montessori materials, and curriculum planning. The practicum

component provides the student with a supervised teaching and learning experience and a period of observation, internalization, and further study,

in order to bring together the theory and practice of Montessori

education.

All grades for course work including the final grade will be given in percentages. The official transcript will reflect percentage and corresponding letter grade. A successful pass in each course is 65%.

Evaluation on practicum is on a pass/fail basis.

Complete required course requirements: pass (65%) in all the courses and gain a pass in the practicum.
